Transfer Station Stickers...UGH!

I would normally use this platform to tell you about all the wonderful things that are happening in North Stonington (and there are many). However, I thought it best to address the “elephant in the room,” the dreaded Transfer Station Fees.

As we know, the cost of disposing waste is getting more expensive every year. We have had a wonderful option over the years of being able to dispose trash, recyclables, and bulky waste with no additional charge to the resident, other than what was carried in the yearly Town Budget. We, the Selectmen, felt the time had finally come for us to explore a user fee of sorts and have decided to institute a sticker fee and a bulky waste fee, which would both begin in July of 2023.



Transfer Station Sticker Fees: We will begin selling vouchers for stickers at the Town Hall beginning on Wednesday, July 5th during regular Town Hall hours (Monday – Friday from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm). You will also be able to purchase a voucher on the following Saturdays: July 8th, 15th, 22nd from 9:00 am until 12:00 noon. You will then be able to go to the Transfer Station to get your sticker applied to your vehicle. The new sticker program will be enforced after Wednesday July 19th, however, a proof of residency will be required up until that time. The BOS will be fine tuning the actual logistics of this program over the next few months.

Sticker fees will cost \$40.00 and will be good for 2-years. One fee per household. All other vehicles could get a sticker at no addition charge. The additional vehicles will need to go to the Transfer Station to have stickers applied to their windshields. The new fee program will be strictly enforced.

Bulky Waste Fees: We will start this program establishing fees for Small, Medium, Large and Ex-Large trucks (fees to be determined). We will also be exploring the use of scales and what expense is associated with their use. We know that our Bulky Waste pile’s life will be coming to an end soon. We hope with the use of fees and enforcement, we can prolong that life. Closing the Bulky Waste pile will create a large expense to the Town. This part of the new initiative would begin on July 1st, 2023.

HEWITT FARM

As we wait for spring to arrive, Hewitt Farm with its open space continues to draw visitors for the clean air and the many trails that are so popular. Across the field from the house is the pavilion inviting visitors to stop, sit and enjoy the day after walking the trails.

The Artisan Farm Market will host four events at the farm through spring and summer in 2023. Last year's events were a complete success. The first event is scheduled for May 21st. Future event schedules are posted on the Recreation Department web site. The pavilion can be reserved for a private event by visiting the Recreation Department website and scheduling the event.

A young resident, working on his Eagle Badge has built an Orienteering Course on the farm. An orienteering course is essentially a land navigation course composed of a start point, end points and mid points by which one typically uses a map and compass to complete. The course utilizes our existing trails. Anyone can use it and instructions are posted by the community garden corn crib.

Hewitt Farm is open daily from dawn to dusk. It's free, easy to get to, right near the village and Holly Green. Park just inside the Hewitt Road entrance off Route 2 or at the parking area down Hewitt Road from Ryder Road. ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Elderly homeowners who were 65 years old or older on January 1, 2023, and who had income under \$49,100 for a married couple, or \$40,300 for a single person, can apply for the elderly homeowner's program. Disabled homeowners can also apply if they are on the disability program; the same income limits apply. The benefit range is from \$150 to \$1,250 off your town property taxes. The benefit depends on your income. This is a State of Connecticut program.

The paperwork required to file includes your federal income tax return that you filed with the internal revenue service, plus your social security 1099 form(s). If you do not need to file with the IRS, then copies of your 1099's for interest, dividends, and all other income, including social security, is required. This is based on 2022 earnings and applications are accepted until May 15th.

Veterans can receive an increase in benefits if they qualify for the Elderly Homeowner's Program. The deadline for filing is October 1, 2023.

Renters with a social security disability, or who are 65 years old, can apply for the Renter's Program between April 1st and October 1st, 2023. Paperwork includes the same income as the Elderly Program, plus rent receipts, your electric bills, and your heating bills for the year 2022.

Pro-rates on your motor vehicle taxes, for those that sold a motor vehicle and returned the license plate, are available. To apply for a credit, you must show a plate receipt that indicates the vehicle was sold. The credit equals an 8.33% reduction for every month from when you sold the vehicle, to September 2023. As an example, if you sold your vehicle in March 2023, you are entitled to a 50% reduction in your tax bill.

Happy Spring! Fishing season will soon be here. Come to the office to get your sporting licenses and regulation guides or purchase them online at www.ct.gov/deep.

The Spring season also brings an increase in marriage licenses. If you plan on getting married in North Stonington, a marriage license must be obtained from the Town Clerk's Office. Please call the office with any questions.

Dog licensing for the new dog licensing year will begin on June 1st. Due to scheduling conflicts, the Rabies Clinic will be held earlier this

year. The Rabies Clinic is being held on **Saturday, May 27, 2023**, from 10:00 AM to 12:00 Noon at the Town Hall. The fee is \$15.00 cash only. All dogs must be on leashes and all cats in carriers. The Town Clerk's Office will start selling dog licenses on **June 1, 2023**.

The Town Clerk's Office is the place to obtain an absentee ballot for all town referendums, primaries, and elections. There will be a Budget referendum in May. There is an election for Town offices on November 7, 2023.

The average age of cars on the road today in the USA is 11.9 years old.

National Fire Protection Association (NFPA)1901 is the Standard which we follow when building/purchasing emergency apparatus. This and other similar standards help dictate a town's ISO rating (Home Insurance Cost).

This Standard provides the following:

- Any apparatus over 15 years of age should be put in reserve.
- Any apparatus over 20 years of age it isn't cost effective to update (refurbishment).
- Any apparatus 25 years of age or older should be placed out of service.

This information was given to the Board of Selectmen and Board of Finance so they could see on a single page the age of our current fire apparatus. We are in a critical position that needs to be addressed. These trucks belong to the Town, and I feel we need to come up with, and commit to a Long-Range Capital Plan that addresses the replacement of these apparatus in a timely manner. Years of pushing off purchases has caused the fleet to become aged and is now causing a potential significant budget impact. Over the years the Fire Company has continued to present long range plans to address a systematic schedule of apparatus replacement which have not been accepted and/or followed. Any current plan looking at less than 15-20 years can skew the actual anticipated needs at today's level.

I ask that an account be created for Fire Apparatus Purchases and funded in each budget. These funds shall remain in the Town's possession until a request is made to the Board of Selectmen for a purchase that follows the Apparatus Replacement Schedule.

While Mother Nature continues to tease us with alternating bouts of balmy and Arctic weather, the NSGC is planning for our **Annual Plant Sale**, which will take place, rain, or shine, on **Saturday, May 13, 9am-noon** at the North Stonington Elementary School. Mark your calendars!



Once again, we will be promoting native plants that support pollinators, and members are raising a variety of seedlings, which will be offered as healthy, well-established plants at the sale. This year's selections (which are different from last year) will include anise hyssop (*Agastache foeniculum*), wild white indigo (*Baptisia alba*) and obedient plant (*Physostegia virginiana*). All of these are plants support native pollinators in your garden, promoting your vegetable crops, as well as enhancing your environment with flowers and by attracting butterflies. In addition, of course, we will be offering our usual wide variety of locally grown perennials and shrubs, annuals, vegetables, tomatoes, herbs, bulbs and hanging baskets, as well as our always-intriguing rummage table.

We will have a local representative from Wild Ones on site to answer your questions and to help advise you on incorporating native plants into your home landscaping.

Don't miss the opportunity to bring a soil sample for testing by URI Master Gardeners. You can find instructions for collecting a suitable sample at our website: www.nsgardenclub.org/the-importance-of-soil-testing.

For your convenience, we will be accepting credit cards and offering a holding area where you can 'park' your plants while continuing to shop. A few carts will be available, but there are never enough, so please feel free to bring your own. Looking forward to seeing you!

KEEPING NORTH STONINGTON AFFORDABLE



KNSA has moved forward in the development of land gifted to us by Trinity Long Island Trust, Regina McGowan, Trustee. Our Legacy of Generosity fundraising campaign raised money to have this property declared a usable building lot. This month we successfully subdivided it into two building lots. We now begin the work to obtain the funds to build two affordable homes on this beautifully situated village property.

A grant has been submitted to the 1772 Foundation to do restoration work on the 1840 schoolhouse on Clarks Falls Road which the town quitclaimed to us to be rehabilitated into an affordable home. We wait to hear on the outcome of that submission. We have hired an architectural firm to develop plans for rental housing on Wintechog Hill.

The only way to deliver affordable housing is to use land that is given to us or to acquire land at a very attractive price and to subsequently create units that are cost effective to build. Providing this land for affordable housing while generating tax revenue for the town is a wise use of an available resource.

KNSA is always searching for those who would like to help in its mission to provide affordable housing in North Stonington.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION



Much of our work this late winter has been a continuation of planned work. We completed two extensive grant applications for money to begin a wheelchair accessible trail within the Assekunk Borderlands trail between the school's playing fields and Pinewoods Road. The smaller grant has been rejected and we await notification of the larger grant.

We continue making progress on a bicycle trail map showing routes, level of difficulty and elevations. Both road routes and mountain bike trails will be highlighted. We hope to be finished by fall.

This year's community calendar is sold out. The theme for next year is the community events around town. Watch out for photos of some school events, the Memorial Day Parade, the Grange Fair, Halloween Fest, carol singing and a myriad of events at the library.

We have worked throughout the year updating the Plan of Conservation & Development for 2023, identifying land parcels appropriate for adjoining to the three wildlife/greenway corridors. Four landowners have inquired how they may preserve or divest their property. We have shared a host of possible alternatives with them as they make plans for the future of their land.

With spring now upon us and more of us are out hiking our trails, as good stewards of our land, please pick up limbs fallen on the trails and report trees down or other serious impediments to safe travel for our removal.

Earth Day is Saturday, April 22. Please join us in picking up trash along our roads.

Those tiny "nips" are everywhere as well as cans and bottles thrown by thoughtless travelers. Choose a side road (not a heavily traveled state highway) and aide us in keeping North Stonington clean & attractive.

TAX COLLECTOR

Hi, everyone and happy spring! I hope everyone had a safe and healthy winter. I want to take a minute to thank everyone and express my gratitude for all your warm smiles and welcoming comments during my first collection season here in North Stonington. It has been a pleasure to be here and meet those of you who came into the townhall.

For your information, the prior collector and the town engaged a lockbox firm for help with collections. This company receives your payments and processes the checks directly to the bank. They send a file to the tax office for review and the processing your payments. I would gladly have you stop by and pay in person or have you mail it directly to the townhall at 40 Main Street, North Stonington, CT 06359. However, you will receive an envelope to send it to the lockbox service in Boston with your bills.

This was my first experience with a lockbox company, and I must say it was a smooth transition and we worked very well together. Prior to my hire, the town had sent all delinquent bills to American National Recovery Group to help with collecting those delinquent taxes. I have worked with ARNG prior to coming here and they are also great to work with. However, there is a 15% charge on top of the tax, for their service, which you will pay when paying through them. We will continue to use both services, as far as I am aware, as they have already been established. To avoid the collection agency, taxes must be paid in full in a timely manner. We will be sending the current year bills to ANRG soon, as stated on the delinquent notices. To avoid the lockbox process, you can always mail to the townhall, use the drop box outside the townhall or just stop in and pay in person.

The tax office hours are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 8:30 to 3:30 and Friday from 9 to 11 for collections.

I look forward to seeing more of you again in July. Enjoy the warmth of spring!

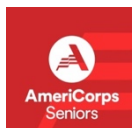

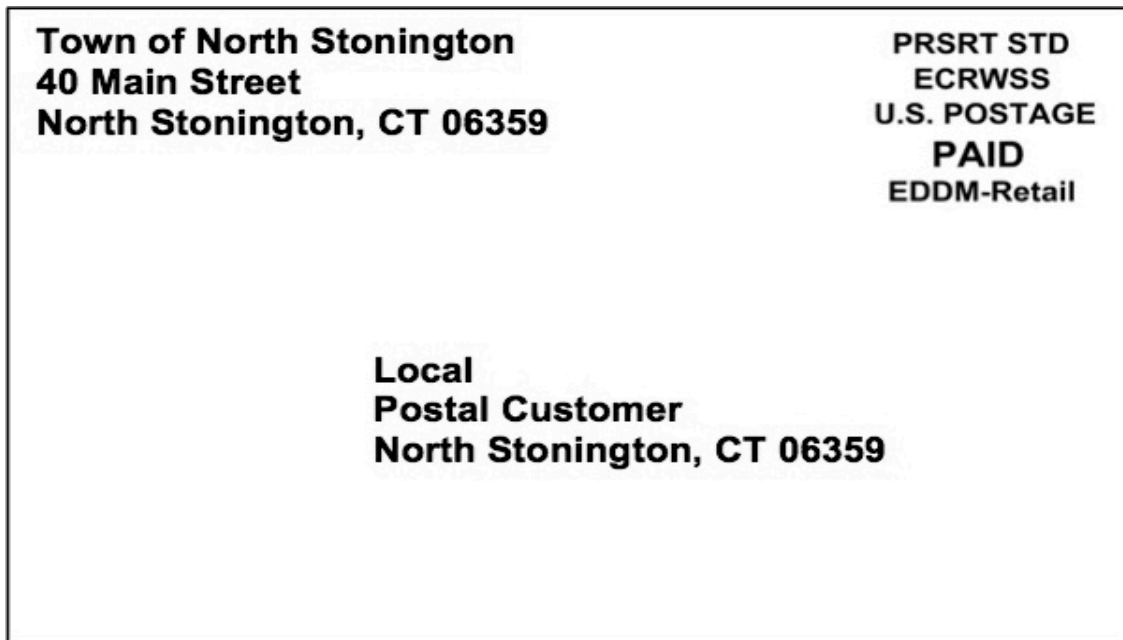
